Common Bibliography Types

Below are the formats for a range of common sources, followed by an example. The bibliography should be presented in alphabetical order.

Book:

Author (Date) Title. Place of Publication: Publisher.

Goldberg, R. (1988) Performance Art. Singapore: C.S. Graphics

Book Chapter in an edited book or Anthology:

Author (Date) 'Title of Chapter' in Editors *Titled of Book or Anthology*. Place of Publication: Publisher.

Prosser, R. (2021) 'Vonni Diva: Showgirl' in Edward, M. & Farrier, S. (ed) *Drag Histories, Herstories and Hairstories.*

London: Methuen Drama.

Journal

Author (Date) 'Title of article', Title of Journal, Issue, Page number(s)

Case, J. & Gunstone, R. (2003) 'Going Deeper than Deep and Surface Approaches: A study of students' perceptions of time', Teaching in Higher Education, 8:1, pp. 55-69

Website (as with the in-text reference, any unknown information is not included) Author (Date) *Title*. Available at: URL (Accessed: date)

Cvejić, B. (2012) *Interview Anne Teresa De Keersmaeker*.

N.B. It is acceptable to use a corporate author if your source was not written by an individual e.g. One Dance UK or NATO.

Name of AI (Date) Medium of communication, receiver of communication, day/month of communication

Author (Date) 'Title of article', *Title of Journal*, Issue & Page number(s), *Name of Collection* [Online]. Available at: URL (Accessed: date)

Title of film (Date) Director [DVD]. Place of distribution: Distributor

It is not always possible to reference exactly as given in the guidelines above. Remember: In-text referencing must link clearly to the bibliography, and the bibliography must contain enough information to locate the original source.

No Author, Date or Title

If information about your source has not been provided you can substitute information in the reference, using 'unknown', (no date) and [square brackets]. You shouldn't guess or input incorrect information.

No date of publication:

Roberts, H. (no date) Improvisation for beginners. Belfast: Assembly Publishers

No title:

James, Z. (2017) [Essay about Pina Bausch]. Belfast: Assembly Publishers

No author:

Unknown (2017) The dancer's guide to injury. Cardiff: The Independent Dancer.
